## **MAYOR'S REPORT**

Mayor Rendo stated that today is Councilman Belgiovine's birthday so we all wish him a very happy birthday. There is cake here for everyone to enjoy.

## **ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT**

Administrator Padilla stated that at the last Council meeting Mr. Cabrera came in to make some suggestions on Werimus Road regarding the speed limit and it being a county road. Mr. Padilla forwarded that information to the Chief of Police and traffic bureau. They did a preliminary look at it. First and foremost they have to send that to the county because it is a county road. The county will have to undergo any studies if they wish to do so. However, their recommendation is that they really have not had a large speeding issue there. They are also opposed to a four-way stop sign which was one of the suggestions. Four-way stop signs especially in that type of intersection are actually a lot more confusing than a regular type of intersection. They feel that that may actually add problems as opposed to alleviate problems. The other thing that they reported is that the county will rarely reduce a speed limit on county roads. County roads were designed and created to move traffic along. They did suggest that perhaps we get one or two of those blinking stop signs. Mr. Padilla will work with the Chief on that for next year.

Administrator Padilla stated that we are finalizing the paving. Mr. Jacobs will give a final report on that. We did have some concerns on Shaw Road. The Mayor and Council received an email from a resident. Administrator Padilla spoke to all of the residents, for and against it. Initially we received several concerns about speeding on Shaw Road. We had looked at adding some traffic safety measures there, rumble strips and painting "slow" along the roadway. Mr. Padilla met again with the engineer and the Chief of Police and the rumble strips may again cause further issues. They are loud. If a heavy truck goes over them later at night especially we are probably going to be getting a lot more complaints on that. The issue with the "slow" wording, Mr. Padilla spoke with the Chief and he advised him that the last time they looked at that roadway where they measured the speed, at that time the data they have up-to-date is that it really is not a speed issue, it is a volume issue. That is their expert opinion. Mr. Padilla spoke with the Chief again today and what they are going to do is to restripe the yellow line from Werimus down the snake turn to about number 17. That will be reinstated and be done. The "slow" sign will not be done at that time. The Chief and Traffic Bureau will take a look at the data again in the spring. Mr. Dario stated that one of the other towns that he represents did a rumble strip that had to be removed within 6 months because of all the complaints. It was a waste of money.

Mr. Padilla stated that PSE&G has paved a couple of roads. Earlier this year, there was some underground work, transformers, that had to be done on Heritage Court and they had to dig up that road. Before we gave them permission earlier in the year, we told them that that road was just recently paved and they would need to repave the whole road. They agreed. Linda Terrace recently had a gas line put in for the whole length of it, they also are re-milling and paving that road. We are splitting the cost with them because that was an older road.

## **COUNCIL MEMBERS COMMENTS/REPORTS**

Council President Panso stated that he has some DPW updates for November. Some of the things that they are been dealing with are: striped all the soccer fields, picked up all the garbage off the fields, worked on police vehicles, finished winterizing all the Borough buildings, put up lights for the holiday trees and holiday decorations at the Lydecker House, train station and Borough Hall, and they are been out in full force for October and November removing the leaves (collected so far 13,000 cubic yards of leaves). The DPW has run 3,352 cubic yards of compacted leaves to the recycling. They received 2 more plows that were order to replace the 30 year old plows that were no longer reliable. They are expecting delivery of the new heated body dump truck with the plow and salter. That will be ready for use during the winter season. They leaf season has been extended and the last day to put out leaves to the street is Sunday, December 10<sup>th</sup>. They had a sewer main break on Woodcrest and that is being repaired today.

Administrator Padilla stated that we had planned on having the street sweeper come in a couple of weeks, but due to the extension of time for leaf pick-up, we will have to see if Paramus is available the following week.

Councilman Belgiovine stated he wanted to have an open discussion about a concept that he has spoken to some council members about which is the barn. The old DPW barn which has really just been utilized as a shed for the last 10 years. He thinks it is a good idea to try and get the Council's approval to look into it further about making it a restaurant. Going out to bid for a vendor to come in basically and make an application proposal to rehab the building and put a restaurant there. Councilman Belgiovine just wanted to have a quick discussion about it. Councilwoman Gadaleta asked if there was plumbing in the shed. Councilman Belgiovine replied that there is plumbing and electric there. They may need to bring in gas. There is no natural gas. It is heated by fuel oil right now, but there is gas in the street that they could get and if not they can use propane. Councilwoman Gadaleta asked if it would still be owned by Woodcliff Lake. Councilman Belgiovine replied that it would still be owned by the Borough. It would probably be a ground lease so that the Borough is exempt from liability on the structure. Whoever the vendor is they would have to come in and engineer what they want to do with that structure. Councilwoman Gadaleta asked who would pay for the engineering of the structure. Councilman Belgiovine replied that the vendor would. The Borough wouldn't be responsible for dealing with the structure at all. That is the idea to find out what we can and cannot do with it. His understanding is that if it is Borough-owned we could get a liquor license there. We have a beautiful asset there and we are looking and different ways of trying to utilize it. It would be another revenue source for the Borough as well. Councilwoman Gadaleta stated that it sounds like a very good idea. Councilwoman Hayes stated that the electrical in that building is literally hanging. Councilman Belgiovine stated that the building needs a complete overhaul. Councilwoman Hayes stated that in terms of electrical and plumbing it is a whole redo. It's like

it's not even there. Councilman Belgiovine stated that he brought our planner through it. The structure is old but they could basically skin it, straighten it out and then reside it and lock it all back together. They can definitely save the structure. They would have to reinforce it in different ways. Councilwoman Hayes stated that the last time she saw the foundation it was really questionable. Councilman Belgiovine stated that the only one corner that has any type of erosion is from water running down. It's not structural. It is from water eroding a cinder block. It has actually been patched with cinder block. The rest of it is fieldstone and it is built like a fortress. That would be up to the engineering that they come in with and they would have to obviously insure that they have a great structure. Mayor Rendo stated that it has to go out for bid. Councilman Belgiovine stated yes it would have to go to bid. Basically they would have to come back with a proposal and some sort of a drawing or engineering of what they would want and they would be proposing it, hours of operation, what type of services. NJ Transit would probably want them to offer some sort of services for breakfast to serve the commuters. It would probably be similar to what happens in Westwood which is basically have a couple of local restaurants that are open that service some of the commuters. Councilwoman Hayes asked if this would have to go before the Zoning Board. Councilman Belgiovine stated that we will find out and go to the next step. Attorney Dario stated that the liquor license would be the key to this property. Mayor Rendo asked Councilman Belgiovine if he wanted to authorize the Engineer, Borough Counsel and Borough Clerk to take a look at that and prepare a proposal. Councilman Belgiovine asked that a Resolution be placed on the Agenda for the next Mayor and Council meeting. Administrator Padilla stated that he would look into it to see what it would cost from our Borough Engineer. Councilwoman Hayes asked if they would let the Zoning Board know about this. Mayor Rendo stated that they included the Borough Planner in on this. Mayor Rendo stated that years ago a survey was taken and the residents' main request was that they wanted more restaurants in Woodcliff Lake.

Councilwoman Gadaleta asked if the tree lighting would still be on tomorrow night if it's a downpour. The weather is not supposed to be cooperating tomorrow night. Administrator Padilla replied that we will light it quickly and then go to Tice Center to see Santa. The tree lighting begins at 6:30 PM tomorrow night and the Menorah lighting is December 13<sup>th</sup> at 6:00 PM. Councilwoman Gadaleta thanked Administrator Padilla because she received a number of phone calls on Saturday regarding Shaw Road from a couple of different residents and she called Tom and he was on top of it. He went to Shaw Road, talked to the residents and listened to their concerns.

Councilwoman Hayes stated that she noticed on the Agenda, Resolution No. 17-214, has some transfers which is typical. We had some last meeting and again this meeting. Councilwoman Hayes asked for a quick finance update. She knows that there is always room to maybe roll over money into next year. How are we looking for year-end? Councilman Belgiovine replied that as of the last report we got we are looking fine. He has not received November numbers yet from Harold. The whole Council now gets it. Administrator Padilla stated that this is early. We normally puts it out at the end of the first week. Councilman Belgiovine stated that either at the first or second meeting in November we got October's numbers and we were running fine, right on schedule.

Mayor Rendo stated that at our last meeting we approved the South Werimus Road improvements. We are going to start removing some trees there. They have been marked. We are just waiting for the transfer of money from the Open Space Fund into the General Fund so that the contractor can start.

Councilman Belgiovine stated that we had a Green Team meeting last week and we are looking into some solar grants and a couple of different other paths that we might be able to go to get more credits for next year.

### **PUBLIC COMMENT**

MOTION to open to the public was made by Councilwoman Gadaleta, seconded by Councilman Belgiovine and unanimously approved.

Clay Bosch, Woodcliff Lake, had a suggestion. He has been thinking about this a long time and finally decided to bring it to the Mayor and Council's attention. Mr. Bosch stated that he thinks we should have an Annual Report. Mr. Bosch bought in an Annual Report (small book) from a small town in Massachusetts. It is approximately the same size of Woodcliff Lake in population. This report comes out every year. It is an encyclopedia of information. A report and index of statistics of that kind. Each department head submits a report, Police, Fire, DPW, Shade Tree, Building etc. They say what they did during the year and what they plan on doing next year. It also contains all of the residents' names, addresses and how much they pay in taxes. Councilwoman Gadaleta asked if we could borrow the book.

Councilwoman Hayes asked Mayor Rendo if he had the opportunity to talk to the owner on Broadway regarding the planting of additional trees and if he could give an update. Mayor Rendo stated the owner stated that he planted the five trees that you requested but will not plant the additional two trees that you just requested. Mayor Rendo stated that the owner said that it would impede the site lines coming out of the properties so they decided not to put up the additional 2 trees. Mr. Bosch stated that the site looks naked. Mayor Rendo recommended that when a developer comes in and presents a tree plan, every recommendation from the Shade Tree Committee should be in the approved plan initially, not after the fact. Mr. Bosch stated that when they got the drawings and commented, because of some change they plans went to the Zoning Board, not the Planning Board, and came back from the Zoning Board with no trees on the plans.

Josephine Higgins, Woodcliff Lake, asked our engineer what infrared patches means. Mr. Jacobs explained to Mrs. Higgins what it meant. Mrs. Higgins stated we are going to probably need additional space for the items that are in the Barn. Mrs. Higgins stated that there is a house on Saddle River Road that the Borough should look into buying to put an access road there to the compactor. This would improve safety. This would also enable the Borough to put up another structure for DPW equipment. Mrs. Higgins suggested that the Borough look into this.

MOTION to close to the public was made by Councilman Piantino, seconded by Councilman Belgiovine and unanimously approved.

Everyone sang Happy Birthday to Councilman Belgiovine.



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**ENGINEER'S REPORT**  
**BOROUGH OF WOODCLIFF LAKE**  
**DECEMBER 4, 2017**

**1. 2017 Municipal Road Program**

Start Date: October 3, 2017  
End Date: November 23, 2017 (tentative)  
Budget Cost: \$500,000 (municipal) + \$150,000 (NJDOT FY2016 Grant) + \$150,000 (NJDOT FY2017 Grant)  
Status: Punch-list Phase

The 2017 Municipal Road Program officially began construction on October 3, 2017. The contractor has virtually completed all work for the project. NEA is currently preparing a punch-list of any outstanding issues to be addressed. NEA will provide the Borough with an update as soon as the information is available.

**2. Wright Street Pavement Surface Modification**

A resident of Wright Street complained about apparent "roller streaks" on the surface of the pavement in front of their residence. NEA contacted the paving contractor, who initially paved the road about two years prior (part of 2015 or 2016 road program). The contractor recently returned to the site and performed surface modifications.

**3. Bank Stabilization and Outfall Reconstruction at 77 Brookview Drive**

Start Date: To Be Determined  
End Date: To Be Determined  
Budget Estimate: \$160,377.50 (NEA Preliminary Estimate dated March 6, 2017)  
Status: Survey and Wetland Delineation completed, design ongoing, permit submission pending

NEA submitted the permit applications to the NJDEP on November 10, 2017. The permit application is currently under review by the NJDEP. NEA anticipates a response from the NJDEP during February of 2018. Bid documents will likely be finalized before the end of the year, and will likely go out to bid in early 2018, for spring 2018 construction.

**4. Glen Road Culvert**

Budget Estimate: \$310,316.00 (estimate by Brooker Engineering, last revised July 6, 2016)

NEA understands that while the overall scope of the project has been defined, there has been disagreement between Park Ridge and Woodcliff Lake regarding financial responsibility for the repairs/improvements. NEA is in the process of coordinating with Brooker Engineering to setup a meeting to discuss the project. NEA will provide an update once this meeting has occurred.

**5. Werimus Lane Bridge Repair**

Start Date: October 1, 2015  
End Date: May 13, 2016  
Part 1 Repairs: \$18,000.00 total (50/50 cost sharing), completed in 2016  
Part 2 Repairs: \$300,750 total (Hillsdale Preliminary Estimate, November 2015)

NEA understands that Phase 1 of the culvert repairs has been satisfactorily completed. The Borough of Hillsdale remains the lead agency for the remaining repairs recommended in the TranSystems' inspection



report, including repair and replacement of gabion walls estimated at \$300,750. Per recent direction from the Mayor and Council, NEA will coordinate and schedule meetings with the Administrators of both Boroughs to define project improvement limits, review estimated construction costs, and agree to terms on the cost responsibilities of each municipality. NEA will then prepare and submit a proposal to the Boroughs for survey, design, permitting, bidding, and construction management of the project as a competitive bid to a proposal to be provided by Hillsdale's Borough Engineer.

#### **6. Bear Brook & Glen Road Erosion Repairs**

Start Date: To Be Determined  
End Date: To Be Determined  
Budget Cost: To Be Determined  
Budget Status: To Be Determined

During coordination related to the above-referenced Glen Road Culvert repair project, the Borough of Woodcliff Lake was notified by Park Ridge of erosion observed on the stream bank of the Bear Brook directly upstream from 38 Glen Road. This observation was made by Park Ridge Borough Engineer, Eve Mancuso, P.E., while responding to a complaint from the property owner at 27 Glendale Road in the Borough of Park Ridge. Her concern is that this area of the bank is adjacent to Glen Road and any further deterioration or erosion could jeopardize the structural integrity of the embankment of the elevated Glen Road at this location.

Shortly thereafter, NEA made inspection of the affected area with Brooker Engineering and representatives from each Borough. NEA observed erosion of the stream bank between the private property at 38 Glen Road and an existing stormwater outfall approximately 100 to 200 feet upstream. Also observed was the significant transport of sediments and large quantities of both rip rap and river stone by previous flood waters from their upstream origin through the affected area of residential properties at 38 Glen Road (Woodcliff Lake) and 27 Glendale Road (Park Ridge). As such, Mrs. Mancuso suggested coordination of a joint stream restoration project between Boroughs. Park Ridge already intends to perform minor de-silting and de-snagging to remove accumulated river stone for the diverted portion of the stream adjacent to 27 Glendale Road to normalize the channel back to its prior cross-section for the benefit of the Park Ridge resident. She suggested that the Borough of Woodcliff Lake do the same for the diverted portion of the stream adjacent to 38 Glen Road, for the benefit of the Woodcliff Lake resident, while also addressing the concern of the eroded embankment upstream relative to Glen Road.

Please note that in July 2014, the Borough of Woodcliff Lake had previously assisted the homeowner at 38 Glen Road with removal of large fallen trees, tree limbs, and a gabion basket from their property and the Bear Brook by the Bergen County Mosquito Commission under the limitations of the Flood Hazard Area Control Act Permit By Rule statute immediately following the significant flash flood event that caused this damage. The homeowner was also provided direct contact to staff at NJDEP who could assist the homeowner with any further desired stream stabilization on private property that would require permits.

Review of the current tax map confirms that the affected portion of the Bear Brook resides entirely on private property. As such, participating in a joint project with Park Ridge for the sole benefit of each resident would be at the discretion of Mayor and Council. NEA recommends assessment of the eroded stream bank with a geotechnical engineering consultant relative to the stability and structural integrity of the embankment supporting the elevated Glen Road. Should the existing conditions be unstable, the Borough would have a vested interest in any improvements to this private property relative to the eroded stream bank and therefore warrant discussion of a joint project effort with Park ridge to realize cost savings opportunities relative to both NJDEP permitting as well as construction.






## 2017 BUDGET TRANSFERS FOR DECEMBER 4, 2017 MEETING

### RESOLUTION NO. 17-214 DECEMBER 4, 2017
